I received with interest your information about the new British Reformed Fellowship. I myself can heartily subscribe to the Canons of Dordt (I have an original copy in French) and, of course, the Westminster Confession. Many years ago I was "converted" from strong Arminianism to Calvinism by a careful comparison of the Word of God with "The Sovereignty of God" by A W Pink. I have since found both soul and mind refreshment in the great books of the Puritans. The ministry of the late Dr Martyn Lloyd Jones has had a great influence on me in stressing the importance of both doctrine and Christian experience.

However, I have also come to believe in believers' baptism, along with such men as C H Spurgeon, so I do have reservations about those portions of the great confessions which allude to infant baptism. However, I agree with you in holding the centrality of the Covenant of Grace, and the importance of training children in the fear of God - only I do not believe they should be baptised until there

are genuine marks of saving faith. Please let me know if you are open to those who hold a baptist (but note, not a denominational Baptist) position in your Fellowship.

The importance of holding a high view of Scripture is essential, otherwise the very foundation of the church is destroyed.

My wife and I are missionaries with the OMF (formerly China Inland Mission) to support the church in Mainland China and have been based in Hong Kong for eleven years; now we are in the UK for a period, but still as missionaries. I return to China twice each year. The growth of the church in China is a great testimony to the sovereignty of God's grace in the face of savage persecution and a rebuke to all nominal Christianity. The Chinese church numbers 20 million plus evangelicals, so is now the second largest evangelical community in the world after the United States. I enclose a copy of the prayer letter I write and edit which is sent out to some twenty countries. The June report is based on my most recent visit to China this March.'

EDITOR'S REPLY: *I regret to say that membership of the BRF is restricted to those who accept the teaching of the Reformed confessions on baptism. I know this may appear partisan, but we are convinced that the covenant of grace and its relevance to "generations" of believers is a forgotten concept today and one that the church has neglected at her peril. I am sure you will also understand that once an exception is made on one ground regarding applications for membership, it will become very difficult to refuse admission on other grounds, perhaps with more serious consequences.*

Having said this, you will see from the enclosed slip that non-members are welcome to receive the Journal and we would be pleased to send it to you if you

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keeping the Sabbath after the time of Malachi (Matt 12:1-8; Luke 13:10-17; John 7:19-23; etc).

This is why Calvin now concludes his paragraph: "We must be careful... to observe[!] the general[!] doctrine - viz, in order that religion may neither be lost nor languish amongst us, we must[!] diligently attend on our religious assemblies, and duly avail ourselves of those external[!] aids which tend to promote the worship of God" (Acts 20:6-7; 1Cor 16:1-2; Heb 4:8-11; 10:25; Rev 1:10).

It is to the glory of God that the church in that land has survived so many years under Communism - and not only survived but wonderfully grown. Christians in the West frequently get asked about the state of the church in China but are often unable to give a satisfactory answer. The leaflet provides a very useful insight and helps to counter that ignorance. May our gracious and sovereign God richly bless all your work and labour in His service (Hebrews 6:10).'
